#### 4. Report from K-12 Executive Director

HCS administrators attended the Hoboken Family Alliance sponsored All Schools Open House on 10/13 and met with many prospective families. This event provides a great opportunity for Hoboken families to learn about the varied pre-K through high school options in town.

Dr. Joshi of Fairleigh Dickinson University has continued to lead the K-12 faculty and staff in the Institute for Diversity and Social Justice. The most recent sessions have explored teaching with multiculturalism in mind and identifying materials and language that work against our goals of creating an inclusive environment.

The Tomorrow's Teachers students at the Upper School spent a morning visiting K-8 classrooms in preparation for their clinical work at the Lower and Middle schools.



#### 5. Report from Lower and Middle School Administration

Two of our eighth grade students, Jo Conlon and Olivia Cahn, had their Girls Who Code work for the littleBits Birthday Challenge featured on the site's blog: <a href="http://littlebits.cc/community-news-cake">http://littlebits.cc/community-news-cake</a>. The contest called on students to create inventions to celebrate the 5th anniversary of the littleBits site. Jo and Olivia created a drawing robot that wrote "Happy Bday" as a part of the Girls Who Code club. LittleBits hasn't announced a winner yet.

The Lower and Middle School programs have contracted with Stacey van der Veen of Next Generation Science Standards Professional Development (NGSSPD) to provide four full day professional development sessions to our K-8 science teachers around the shift to the New Jersey Student Learning Standards for Science, which are modeled off of the NGSS. The sessions will be a collaboration between HCS, Golden Door and Learning Community Charter Schools. Teachers will work to unpack the content and demands of the standards, as well as to develop units and lessons aligned to them.

The K-8 program welcomed parents and guardians to Back to School Night on Thursday, September 22. Families were able to meet with their child(ren)'s teachers, administrators and support staff; learn about the instructional program; and tour the building.

On September 27th at 6:30 pm, Middle School students and their families were invited to a presentation co-hosted by CORE Mental Training and Performance Prep. The workshop provided students with tools for managing anxiety and mastering the art of performing under pressure. Trainer Brian Levenson led students through his lessons and exercises in mindfulness. Students had the opportunity to work directly with the trainer, heard about his experiences conquering the challenges of high-stress situations, and picked up valuable tips and tools to support them during tests, in the classroom, on the stage, or on an athletic field.

The Hudson County Prosecutor's Office and the Hudson County Sheriff's Office were at HCS on Tuesday, October 4 from 9:00-11:00 am to offer voluntary child fingerprinting for all students in grades K-8. The County is working to visit all elementary schools to alert and assist families in gathering and retaining pertinent and critical information about their children in the unforeseen event that their child is missing. Participating children were fingerprinted with their class, and families were provided with a fingerprint ID card containing prints and an area for families to insert additional detailed information that can be kept in a safe place at home. This information can be provided to police in an effort to locate a child.

During the week of October 4-7, HCS observed the Week of Respect, an annual statewide observance to promote positive school culture as a part of the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights. The activities for the week were as follows:

- Tuesday, October 4 Friday, October 7: Messages About Respect Students participating in the Student Government read a quote/message about respect on the morning announcements each day.
- Tuesday, October 4: Respect Nominations Students completed nomination forms throughout the week about other students who have shown them respect and placed them in a box outside the office. Prizes were awarded to both the nominee and person who nominated him/her one for Lower School, one for Middle School.
- Wednesday, October 5: Unity Chain Led by the Student Government, students wrote and drew about kindness and respect on strips of paper. The Student Government created a building-wide chain that was hung in the lobby.



- Thursday, October 6: Teasing and Bullying Lessons Each homeroom class completed an antibullying lesson based on lessons provided by the NJ Bar Association.
- Friday, October 7: Yellow Shirt Day Students and staff wore yellow shirts in honor of the golden rule: treat others as you would like to be treated.

#### 6. Report from Upper School Administration

On October 14th, the HCS-Upper School 9th, 10th, and 11th graders took the PSAT exam. Results will be made available in the spring.

As part of the Upper School's capstone service learning project, the seniors have been meeting and working with Ms. Septimus, the Upper School Service Learning Coordinator, on a daily basis.

As part of the Upper School's ongoing commitment to service learning, the Upper School will be participating in the NJ Clean Communities Coastal Clean Up on November 13th at Lincoln Park in Jersey City.

#### Focused Academic Assistance Program

- Hoboken Charter School's Upper School believes that is not too late to improve academic outcomes for students who have been identified as deficient in certain academic areas. The individualized attention that our Upper School places on classroom instruction and in these tutoring sessions can be highly beneficial to a student's overall academic success. By providing students with this additional opportunity to increase their overall skills in the areas of math and ELA, our students will be more prepared for the rigorous and challenging academic endeavors in front of them.
- Students have been identified based on their Spring 2016 PARCC scores and/or their Measurement of Academic Progress (MAP) scores as someone who would benefit from this extra time with a teacher. These sessions will be solely focused on improving areas of deficiency as determined by the aforementioned assessments.

The Upper School ArtsBridge program will begin on 10/19. Courses for the semester include: Guitar, Artmaking and More, Public Speaking and Comedy, Mock Trial, Creative Math, Criminal Justice, Theater, Film: The Works of Alfred Hitchcock, Robotics, Creative Writing/Storytelling and Choir.

HCS -Upper School students went to the New York City Ballet on October 4th.

The Upper School will have an art exhibit at the Hoboken Library during the month of October.

The Upper School recognized the Week of Respect by engaging students in activities that encourage respect and mindfulness.

The Upper School received a grant and will be partnering with NJ clean communities on a cross-curricular environmental project and a school-wide clean up at Caven Point Beach. Students will also spend the afternoon at Ellis Island where they will learn about the history of the land, immigration and diversity.



The Upper School's service learning organization, Generation On, has signed up for the Kindness Campaign.

Senior Kayla Collins's artwork was selected to be published in *Celebrating Art*.

Junior Kiara Caban's art work is hanging at the Annual Art Educators of New Jersey Conference in Long Branch, NJ.

NJ Clean Communities approved a \$500 grant for the Upper School to take part in an environmental interdisciplinary project on Liberty State Park and Ellis Island.
