4. Report from K-12 Executive Director

During the week of January 17-20, the Lower, Middle and Upper Schools celebrated No Name Calling Week through school-wide activities led by the Middle and Lower School student government associations and the Upper School's Rainbow Society at their respective school buildings. No Name Calling Week is sponsored by the national organization GLSEN and is a national initiative to promote kindness among students of all ages, inspired by the popular young adult novel entitled The Misfits by author James Howe. K-8 students celebrated the week with a poster contest focused on celebrating kindness, judged by the Lower and Middle School SGA officers. Upper School activities were varied and provided the community with the tools to have an effective dialogue about ways to eliminate name-calling.

Congratulations to Upper School Principal Chris Sell as well as HCS Math and Music Teachers for being nominated for the LifeChanger of the Year award. 5. Report from Lower and Middle School Administration

On Saturday, January 14, three teams of Hoboken Charter School Middle Schoolers participated in the New Jersey Region Future City Competition. HCS eighth graders Sophie Bulatovic, Olivia Cahn, Leila Mullally, and Austin Rogers-Myers won third place out of seventy teams. Future City challenges middle school students to imagine, research, design, and build cities of the future around a sustainability issue. The topic this year focused on the power of public space and students were tasked to design innovative, multiuse public spaces to serve a city's diverse population.

As a part of their first trimester Future City Elective, the students worked to simulate a city, wrote a research essay, built a model, and then presented their work to judges who are professional engineers. The eighth graders developed Soleia City, which includes features such as: wind and solar power generation, gasification, ample green spaces and a STEM university. Before announcing the final rankings, the top three teams presented their work in front the entire competition.

On Friday, February 10, the Middle School celebrated national "No One Eats Alone" day (sponsored by the organization Beyond Differences). The day is meant to support kindness and cohesion across grade levels. The Middle School student government organized the event. Five or six students from every grade met in groups in the Middle School classes at lunch time and representatives from the Student Government led their room through ice breakers and games as a way to better get to know students in other grades and received a bracelet from Beyond Differences for their participation.

Several of our Lower and Middle School classes have participated in experiential field trips outside of the classroom:

- Grade 4 visited Jazz at Lincoln Center to model how to teach the Jazz at Lincoln Center jazz music curriculum. In addition to working with instructors, students met members of Wynton Marsalis' jazz band.
- Grades K and 1 attended a performance of "You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown" at Mile Square Theatre

6. Report from Upper School Administration

As part of our commitment to the schoolwide service learning theme of "our country's legal system and social justice", 65 of our Upper School students visited the Hoboken courthouse on February 10th for a tour and a "question – answer" session with Heidi Conlon and Judge Mongiello.

HCS Upper School students continue to volunteer their time at the shelter cooking and serving food to those in need.

The Upper School Seniors, in collaboration with over their community partners, are continuing their senior service learning projects.
