4. <u>Report from K-12 Executive Director</u>

Our annual HCS K-12 Summer Kickoff Volleyball Get Together was held the Friday of Memorial Day weekend at the Multi Service Center. Many students and families turned out for a fun afternoon of fun. Thanks to Mr. Flynn and Mr. Kutchma for coordinating another great event.

We had another successful Field Day last Thursday at Pier A in Hoboken. Students, faculty and families turned out for a fun day of friendly competition. K-8 students participated in a variety of activities under the leadership of Mr. Flynn and faculty/staff as well as 9-12 student leaders.

Dr. Khyati Joshi of Fairleigh Dickinson continued her work with HCS K-12 faculty to support curriculum design around the Social Justice Standards and facilitated discussions around anti-bias education and microaggressions.

5. <u>Report from Lower and Middle School Administration</u>

Back in March, the fourth grade class made a 10 minute video of all the repertoire that was performed at the Carnegie Hall concert. This year the theme was "The Orchestra Swings," and the emphasis was on jazz. They learned how to play (on recorder) and sing songs such as, "I've Got Rhythm" "It Don't Mean a Thing," "Duke's Place," and "When the Saints." The selection committee at Carnegie Hall went through all the videos and picked the best ones to go on stage at Carnegie Hall for the event. The HCS fourth grade class was selected for the second year in a row and performed on stage on May 24. Congratulations to Mr. G and the fourth grade for being selected!

On Wednesday, May 31, nine HCS Girls Who Code club members presented their final coding projects at the NJ/NY Girls Who Code club graduation ceremony. A K - 12 SERVICE LEARNING SCHOOL

On Friday, June 2, HCS Middle School bands performed at the High Notes Music Festival in Pennsylvania. The HCS Jazz Band and 5/6 Concert Band both earned ratings of "Superior." This is the first time since HCS began competing that one of the bands has received this distinction. Additional congratulations to Grace Conlin, Lucy Hartigan, and Ally Fung who had solos during the Jazz Band performance. The 7/8 Concert Band earned a rating of "Excellent." Congratulations to Mr. G and the Middle School Bands!

Summer Gathering took place and on Thursday, June 8 and showcased student musicians across grades K-8.

On Saturday, May 20, members of the Hoboken Charter School math team competed in the Stevens Math Olympiad. The students were offered 15 problems for 90 minutes in five divisions: grades 3-4, grades 5-6, grades 7-8, grades 9-10 and grades 11-12. HCS fourth grader Agastya Batchu earned a perfect score and was the first place winner amongst all fourth graders in attendance. Agastya received his medal at an awards ceremony on June 10.

6. <u>Report from Upper School Administration</u>

On June 13th, our seniors presented their service-based senior projects. These capstone projects were a culmination of the seniors' academic experiences here at HCS and provided the students with an opportunity to merge their various interests, passions, and curiosities with their academic lives while demonstrating autonomy and critical analysis skills.

Our 11th grade class has been involved in a poetry project with the Hoboken Historical Museum throughout this year. In November, Rich Villar, a poet, came into our class and conducted a poetry workshop with our students. From that event, four students were invited to a workshop at the Museum where they were able to work further on their writing and public speaking with students from Elysian Charter School, Hoboken High School, and The Hudson School as well as accomplished poets.

On Saturday, May 20th, there was a publication party at the Hoboken Historical Museum (1301 Hudson Street). Six of our students (Hope Cosme, Kareem Parker, Justin Lai, Christian Marrero, Kiara Caban, and Kaira Widodo) were all selected to do a reading of their poems, and the following students' poems will be included in a published anthology of selected poems centered on the theme of Identity:
