# 4. Report from K-12 Executive Director

K-12 teachers have been working on plans to ensure that all students K-12 will be receiving instructional experiences that address the identity, diversity, justice and action domains as articulated by Teaching Tolerance via the Southern Poverty Law Center starting in the 2017-2018 school year. Dr. Joshi of Fairleigh Dickinson will be working with our teachers over the next two months to support further development and ultimately implementation.



On Friday, March 3, the Upper School Spanish I class had the opportunity to read to the Kindergarten class Dr. Seuss books en Español. Both grade levels started off by introducing themselves using "Me llamo..." With their prior knowledge of Dr. Seuss books, the Kindergartners were able to answer comprehension questions even though the book was in Spanish. After the upper school students read to the Kindergarten students, the K kids thanked the 9th grade using "Gracias" to which the 9th graders replied with "De nada." Both groups really enjoyed the opportunity to learn and share with one another. Thanks to Ms. Reyes and her class for coming over!

#### 5. Report from Lower and Middle School Administration

Mr. Duff, Ms. Blackman and the third grade wrapped up HCS's tenth annual Water Wings event raising almost \$4,000.00 for H2O for Life to support the building of an above ground pipeline for the Shining Hope Girls Academy via the SHOFCO initiative for the Kibera Settlement in Nairobi, Kenya. The students raised an additional \$50 for BeadforLife, and organization that "creates sustainable opportunities for women to lift their families out of poverty by connecting people worldwide in a circle of exchange that enriches all".

On March 15, Maya Espinel and Lucy Hartigan from the 7th grade presented their coding project "Get the Lead Out" at the Girls Who Code Gala. They were one of just a few students from the NYC area and I believe the only middle schoolers invited for this honor. They did an awesome job!

On Saturday, February 11, HCS fourth grader Agastya Batchu came in 8th place at the 58th Annual Jersey Journal-Hudson County Spelling Bee. Students from all over Hudson County participated and the top 8 received prizes. Congratulations to Agastya!

On Wednesday, March 1, HCS hosted a free workshop titled, "Executive Functioning and How it Impacts Academic Success," for Middle School students and parents. Presenters from the organization, Private Prep, facilitated a discussion and presented activities related to studying, organization, impulse control, planning and other critical skills related to academic success. All attendees were provided resources and tips for further exploration.

On Thursday, March 2, the Lower and Middle Schools recognized Pink Shirt Day in recognition of bullying prevention. The day began in 2007 from two high school students in Nova Scotia who decided to take a stand when a classmate was bullied for wearing a pink shirt. Students and staff were to wear a pink shirt to show that they will not tolerate bullying. Students also decorated t-shirt templates with antibullying/kindness slogans that the student government hung around the school.

The HCS Middle School Girls team made it the basketball championship game. They defeated Hoboken Middle School Red in the semifinals 17-15 and lost to Elysian in the finals on Friday, March 3. We are very proud of the team and their accomplishments. The girls were coached by Kevin Flynn and Matt Flannery.

- On Friday March 3rd, Mr. Mahoney took his senior Economics and AP Economics classrooms on their annual trip to Wall Street. This experience allowed the students to get a first-hand look at some of the things that they have been learning about in the classroom.
- On March 8th, Ms. Ryan accompanied our 10th and 11th grade students to the college fair at Kean University.
- On Monday, March 13th, ten students, accompanied by club sponsors Matt Gregory and Tim Mahoney, attended the 26th annual Model UN at St. Peter's University. The Upper School students in attendance were Moroni Aranda, Gabe Acosta, Rozlin Hall, Rebeca Reyes, Hope Cosme, Kaira Widodo, Justin Lai, Conor Simpson, Hanene Gomma, and Alexandra Reyes. Our students did a fantastic job of embracing the event and getting into the spirit of international diplomacy. Students congregated and discussed global issues such as sustainability, disarmament, human trafficking, and extradition, among other topics. It was up to our students to form alliances and broker deals with other nations, which led to several of our students making new friends as a result. This was a wonderful experience for our students and we look forward to returning next year.
- On March 17th, Mr. Gonzalez and Mr. Kutchma took our 9th, 10th, and 11th grade boys to the "Boys to Men Conference" at Montclair State University. This program is geared toward urban teens and provides a daylong program centered on mentoring and empowering our students.
- The Upper School Seniors, in collaboration with over their community partners, are continuing their senior service learning projects.
