12. <u>Executive Director's School Report</u>

HCS has been actively working to increase our social media presence to better educate our own community as well as those outside our community on our mission in action. Efforts are being made to increase activity as well as viewership.

HCS will partner with the Friends of HCS again to launch a survey around parent expertise in areas that could support the school and Friends (for example, accounting, CRM management, alumni affairs, website design, social media specialist, etc.)

Black History Month has been celebrated throughout the K-12 program through student and school-led initiatives in curriculum and programming. See our social media for images of this important work!

13. Lower/Middle School Report

As a service learning project, the sixth grade class organized a toiletry drive for The Lighthouse organization, as a part of their reading of the book "Refugee". This organization helps provide resources for refugees in the area.

On Saturday January 14, HCS continued its tradition of having middle school teams participate in the statewide Future City Competition, which was in person for the first time in three years. Presenting members from two teams showed off their work to judges, who are professional engineers, at the competition held at Rutgers. Using the Engineering Design Process (EDP) and project management skills, students showcase their solutions to a citywide sustainability issue. This year's challenge asks students to address climate change in their city. Both teams worked very hard with all aspects of the competition, which includes a research essay, a scale model, and the in person judging presentation. The teams have been working since September during enrichment elective and mission lab.

The two teams were:

- Seventh graders Julia Mylan and Madison Danni, who presented and were assisted by Mya Watson, Leeanah Groomes, Avery Chavez and Lola Franceski with their city "Dominia."
- Eighth graders Jordyn Eisen, Mark Pitino and Zander Goran who presented and were assisted by fifth graders Nysha Mehendiratta, Brooke Dalton, Chiara Cascetta and Juju Haddad with their city "Arrosa." This team won 8th place out of 60+ teams!

In January, eighth grade students had the opportunity to meet Ron Bautista, a candidate for Hudson County Commissioner, as part of their Government and Civics Unit in social studies. Mr. Bautista spoke about his experience launching his campaign for commissioner, what the position entails and the process for developing a vision for improving Hudson County. The students had an opportunity to ask questions about the local government process.

The Debate Mission Lab sent Arielle Noy, Max Goski, and Claire Goodman as a novice team to the January tournament in the New York Debate League. Arielle won Best Speaker at HCS, the team won 5th place in the novice division, and HCS won the second place trophy for highest percentage of wins.

Congratulations to all the participants in our annual schoolwide grade 4-8 spelling bee on Friday, January 27. A special thank you to Ms. Isom for coordinating the event and a special shout out to our winners: Carolina Fernandez (first place), Adrian Mehta (second place) and Max Goski and Viraj Khosla (third place). Carolina competed at the Hudson County spelling bee at High Tech High School.

During Black History Month, HCS K-4 students engage in the celebration of Black historical figures who have changed the course of history and explore critical events and movements in Black history. Children's literature written and illustrated by Black authors and artists and stories centered in the Black experience are valuable tools for this work.

On Tuesday, February 7, HCS celebrated the 100th day of school. The K-4 classes placed students in multi-grade groups and completed activities to celebrate the day.

Students in the K-8 program participated in the following field trips:

- The Robotic Llamas, our Middle School First Tech Challenge (FTC) robotics team, visited with FTC team Beaks and Bolts from West Caldwell Tech school in preparation for their upcoming tournament.
- The fourth grade class visited the State House in Trenton on Wednesday as a part of their unit on NJ government.
- The kindergarten and sixth grade classes visited the Hoboken Public Library.
- The eighth grade visited the United Nations to visit their exhibit on the Holocaust and human rights to support their reading of Elie Wiesel's "Night".
- The fifth grade class took a trip to the Museum of Natural History in New York City to study the exhibits on early humans. They found examples of tools from the Stone Age as well as artifacts from early civilizations around the world.

14. <u>Upper School Report</u>

We had some inspiring visitors this month. Stevens University students visited to discuss college and career opportunities with students interested in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). Volunteers from Ernst and Young (including parents of LS students) visited with Seniors to talk college and career opportunities.

Classes were able to take trips outside of the school. Cross Cultural Perspectives and Introduction to African American History classes visited the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture. Students had a chance meeting with author and CUNY Professor Dr. Vanessa K. Valdes who took the time to teach them about Langston Hughes and about the center. The Music Club visited the GRAMMY Museum Experience in the Prudential Center to see exhibits showcasing careers in the music industry.

Students began new electives for Marking Period 3.

- Juniors are taking a Mission Aligned course called Experiences. The Experiences course allows students to engage in a personalized experience that reaches to the world outside of school. Experiences may include an internship, research, or a creative project.

- Others chose from the following Social Justice activist tool focused courses:

- Animodules- Using the power of art and creativity to communicate through sculpture. Students will be working with an outside artist from the Barat Foundation thanks to a grant from the Hudson County Arts in Education program.

- Alternative and Renewable Energy Resources- Students learn how to be an educated consumer by examining the negative impacts fossil fuels have on our planet and evaluate the benefits / drawbacks of shifting to alternative and renewable energy resources through various documentaries, interviews, and independent research.

- LatinX Studies- A study of the effects of colonialism, immigration, and modern politics on the peoples of Latin America across the Americas to raise awareness of the effects of colonialism, xenophobia, racism, colorism, or

white supremacy on the Latinx community.

- Music as an Activist's Tool- Student analyze and create popular music with social justice messages.

- World and Character Building -Students explore themes such as Afrofuturism, and the common historical depiction of the exclusion of LGBTQ+, and POC characters through story building, researching, and creating in an illustrative 2D medium.

Students took leadership over our celebration of Black History Month in organizing a Student Performance Showcase with the theme of Dreams and proceeds to benefit the ACLU. Upper classroom also organized a Spirit Week with themed days such as Melanin (wear shades of brown) Monday, Tribute (to the African American flag) Tuesday, Black Culture Wednesday, Throwback Thursday and Blackout Friday (to show support for the BLM movement). Students worked in a committee to ensure that the Black Pride inherent in these days was not cultural appropriation.
