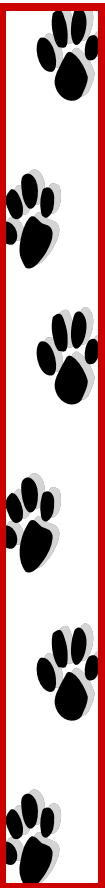

SPANISH WITH SENORA BOWEN



In Spanish I the students worked on the following topics: the seasons, the weather, the calendar and the idioms expressing likes and dislikes. They also discussed other activities. With the vocabulary words of these topics they learned the grammar concepts of definitive and indefinite articles, infinitives, and negative statements.

Durante este mes los estudiantes del noveno grado trabajaron con los temas: las estaciones, el tiempo, el calendario, y como decir que les gusta o no, además de las palabras que indican acción (verbos). Todo esto lo trabajaron en conjunto con las partes gramaticales de los artículos definidos e indefinidos, y el infinitive de los verbos.

In the intermediate classes, the students worked on the following topics: the classroom objects and the adjectives to describe them, their schedules and the school rules. In grammar, they worked with the verb *tener* and the stem-changing verbs like *poder*, *empezar*, and *pedir*. They also learned the affirmative and negative words.

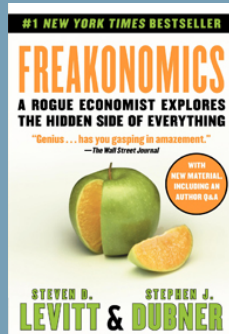
Los estudiantes del décimo grado, trabajaron en los siguientes temas: los objetos de la clase y los adjetivos que los describen, sus horarios y las reglas de la escuela. En gramática ellos revisaron el verbo tener y los verbos de cambio de raíz como poder, empezar y pedir. También aprendieron las palabras afirmativas y negativas.

In the advanced classes, the students worked with the topics of sports, the parts of the body and competencies. In grammar they worked with the verbs used in sports, and to express accidents practicing sports.

HISTORY



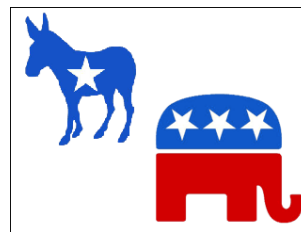
Economics

The senior class in economics explored micro-economics and the laws of supply and demand. The class worked on a case study about credit management, buying a car and investing in stocks. The class will read and study Steven D. Levitt's book *Freakonomics* and explore topics such as: why drug dealers live with their moms, how one's name impacts their destiny, how secret organizations can be destroyed, now *Roe v. Wade* in 1973 reduced crime in the United States and the hidden side of things. Future assignments include the University of Chicago video series on the role of prices, the value of things (service flow and resale) and budget constraints.

World History



The Freshmen have just finished their unit on India. Students debated the Partition of India as well as India's new direction after independence. Students will now set their sights on China, starting with an examination of Chinese religions and philosophies such as Taoism, Confucianism, and Legalism.



United States History II

The junior class in US History II completed a week long political science group project involving analyzing political attitudes, actions and issues. This two part project involved an art component consisting of creating a poster board and answering 32 questions about politics. These questions became a handbook for understanding and analyzing political science. The class also covered from the Civil War through President Theodore Roosevelt.

United States History I

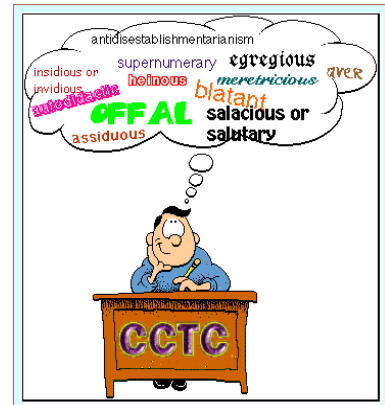
The sophomores just finished writing their essays on the Salem Witch Trials. As they wrote their essays, our classes continued to explore the transition of the English colonies in the 18th century. During this time, students have identified the ways in which the colonies began to develop their own identity and became more autonomous.

9th Grade American Literature

The 9th grade classes have been reading nonfiction articles as a class. We are reviewing qualities of argument and perspective. We will be reading selected pieces from speeches, periodicals and scholarly essays. The students are continuing to build upon their vocabulary and review words from previous lists. The students are also honing their writing skills through lessons focused on grammar and syntax.



10th Grade American Literature

The 10th grade classes are continuing to build up their vocabulary and grammar skills. We are currently reviewing nonfiction pieces on argument and persuasion. Students are responsible for recognizing these aspects in nonfiction pieces in order to recognize bias from fact. The 10th grade will be wrapping up this unit with critical analyses of selected nonfiction works in order to demonstrate their understanding of argument and persuasion.

11th Grade English



The juniors recently completed the novel *Lord of the Flies* by William Golding. They presented and wrote analysis papers on the numerous themes expressed in the tale. Currently, they are learning how to write more effective argument/persuasive papers. This includes them getting comfortable with basic argument structure, reading sample papers and practicing methods of elaboration in their own papers.



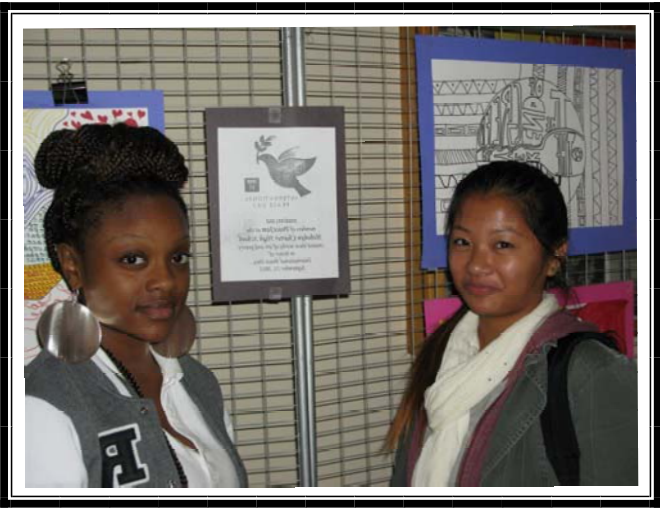
12th Grade English

CHANGE STARTS HERE



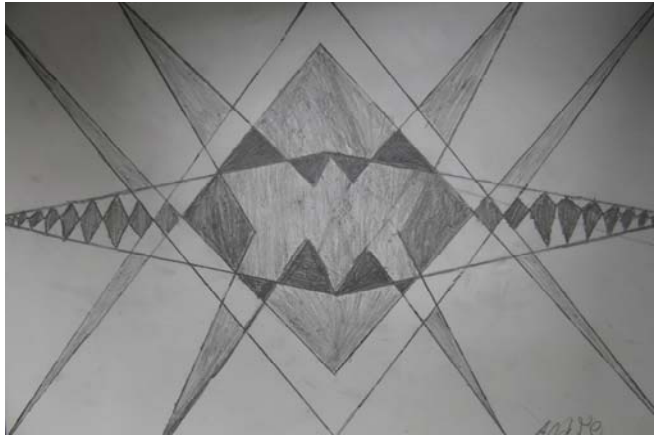
PeaceJam kicked off the year with **“Paintings and Poems for Peace”**, which focused on promoting peace in honor of International Peace Day, which was everyone a piece of paper, and encouraged them to write what peace meant to them. After all of the papers were collected, students designed a mini peace sign and printed of the writings and transferred them onto created a 6 foot peace symbol and They also took the artwork students had ken’s City Hall. We hung all of our anyone to add on. Kudos to PeaceJam-about change, but to making the change.



As part of our “Make A Difference Day”, PeaceJam brought back the *Alliance for Climate Education*. We learned about the environment and how to

recycle, but most importantly we learned how to maximize our resources, and reduce waste. Students were both educated and inspired during ACE’s multi media presentation, especially about the amount of personal space each of us use. As a result of this years Make A Difference Day, the high school will continue to recycle ink cartridges as well as small electronics and phones. In addition; we have set up in our hallway blue recycling boxes for papers, as well as plastic and glass bottles. We also partnered with ACE in their “us vs. waste” campaign. Jammers will be developing projects that will promote use and reuse of many items, not just recyclables. We are currently collecting lightly used (in good condition) and new toys. All toys will be donated before the holidays this year to families who suffered losses due to Hurricane Sandy.

Art Studio “16”



The 9th Graders reviewed symmetry as they created symmetrical designs. Students used pencils, rulers and shading stumps to color in their work. It was a great way to step into the next project.

9th Grade Art

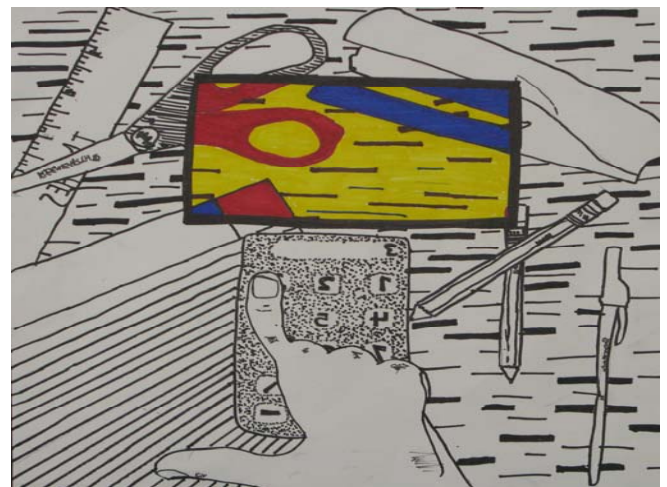


Students first learned about gray scales and created three of them using multiple values from black to white. After they drew their still life, they shaded them in using the shading stumps and their gray scales as references.



We learned about the structure of a face in proportion to all of the features. Students were given examples of abstract faces and encouraged to make a collage of at least 8 faces. When they completed their drawings they used watercolors and metallic paints to finish their work. They used *Sharpies*® to add marks, details, designs and patterns to put the finishing touches on their work.

After learning about the elements and principles of design, students focused on contrast in this next project. Students were instructed to draw their hands in action, including the background. Once the work was completed, students then drew a square on their paper knowing they would have to plan which section would be in color and which would stay in black and white. Students used marks, narrow and bold lines and pointillism to create texture and values in black and white.



Art Studio “15”



Distorted Portraits

Drawing portraits can be difficult, distorting them proved to be exciting. Students decided what features they wanted to emphasize, sketched out their ideas and prepared for their final portrait. We used ebony pencils to complete our projects.

10th Grade Art



Students chose assorted fruit on a branch to create these beautiful oil pastel drawings. Students used the grid method to sketch their work and began with the lighter colors, adding dark for the shadows. After they completed their work, they added their highlights and finishing touches. They are currently on display in our hallway, come check them out!

10th Grade students spent the beginning of the year reviewing the elements and principles of design that was incorporated into their art projects.

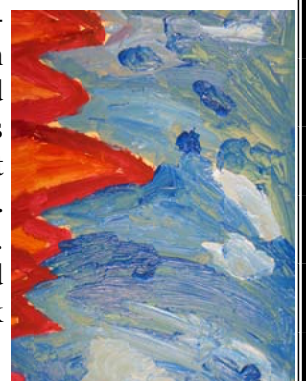


Using balance, pattern, rhythm, contrast, shape and form, students created a geometric design using sharpies. Students learned about different perspectives, as they were encouraged to walk away from their work and looked at it from afar.

Students were given examples of **Chuck Close's** paintings to look at and analyze. We discussed grid painting using multiple colors, patterns and layers. Then students began creating their own painting in **Close's** style. These delightful paintings are hanging near the main office.



The first project was based on repetitive patterns and geometric designs. Students drew out their designs and were given free reign on the medium they wanted to use. Some chose paint, others colored pencils and markers. We used these artworks as a guide for HCS's Gallery 1200 show of "Fire and Water". Students used their first work as a reference for their work using fire and water in the theme. Some students repeated their style, other manipulated the original. Some fire and water works were sold and the others were displayed in the hallway. Student walked around critiquing each others work based on space, emphasis, movement and form.



Art Studio “14”

Art III will be focusing on developing technical and problem solving skills. Students will review the masters as well contemporary and modern artists. They will be developing their abilities in translating the world around them into a three dimensional work on a two dimensional surface. Students will observe and analyze assorted artist styles and integrate them into their own artwork.

11th Grade Art



In working with the theme “Fire and Water” 11th Graders discussed the meaning of each and how they impact our personal lives, and more importantly, how they make us feel. This painting by HCHS artist, **Patrice Sanders** depicts the inner essence of fire and water.



Students learned about Celtic Designs in the beginning of the year. We discussed the Celts and their use of knots and intertwining “roads”. After students drew their designs, they transferred them to a white bandana. We used tie dye to paint

our designs. The bandanas are hanging in the hall for all to see. Once the display is taken down, students will wash them and will be able to wear them as the pigment we used was the same that is used for tie dying clothes. What a great way to reuse art!

In 11th grade Art, we learned about—the “Day of the Dead” which is celebrated in Mexico in November. Students had the opportunity to look at many examples of paintings, drawings, and symbols used during this festive holiday. The wonderful acrylic paintings will be on display next week.



Students were introduced to *Miskit*, a liquid *frisket* that is used with watercolors when an artist wants to leave the paper white. *Frisket* is applied to the paper before painting. Once dried the artist can paint in all areas and when the paint dries, the *frisket* is erased, leaving the space the color of the paper. Students also developed their understanding and application of watercolors as they began to blend, overlap and create multiple tints. Using plants as their theme, students chose an assortment of foliage to complete this project.



Art Studio “13”



12th Grade Art

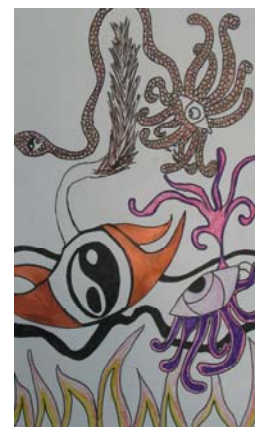


12th Grade students were introduced to “Oil Painting” this year. Students had the opportunity to review all of the artistic styles they had learned in Art History and apply them to their assignment. They were instructed to choose a topic and present three styles of their choice in representing their image. Styles that we saw often were, **Monet**, **Georgia O’Keefe** and **Munch**. These paintings will be in the Hoboken Studio Artist Tour in the Community Church on 6th and Garden Streets as well as in the Hoboken Library in December.



“Inside Our Skin” was the title of this project. Students chose images of famous people and drew them. Instead of drawing the faces, they drew their bones underneath! These comical drawings are in the hallway near the art room. They fit right in since they were done right around Halloween time.

Under and Over has many different meanings and references. Students were instructed to create a living creature that can live both under and over. Students used technical and problem solving skills to create their creature. Using three different media, students completed these animated creatures.



Using words instead of colors and paint in a project requires a tremendous amount of planning. Students learned about typography and how to create one by hand. Students drew their sketches and found their text. Using assorted markers of colors and size, students wrote their songs, poetry and thoughts on the lines. Their words created the borders and outlines, textures and design. We discussed perspective and the difference between looking at something up close and far away. These works are not to be missed!

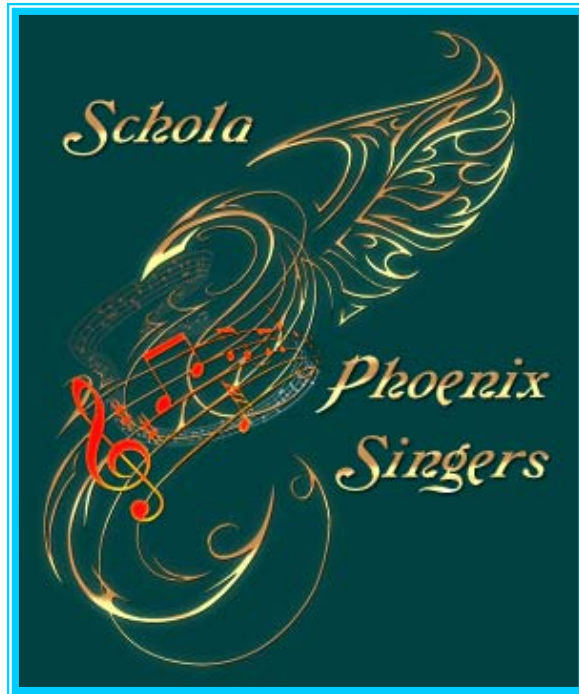

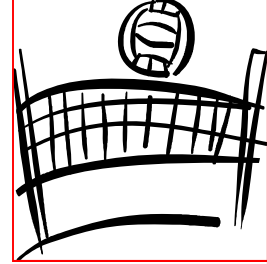

High School Physical Education

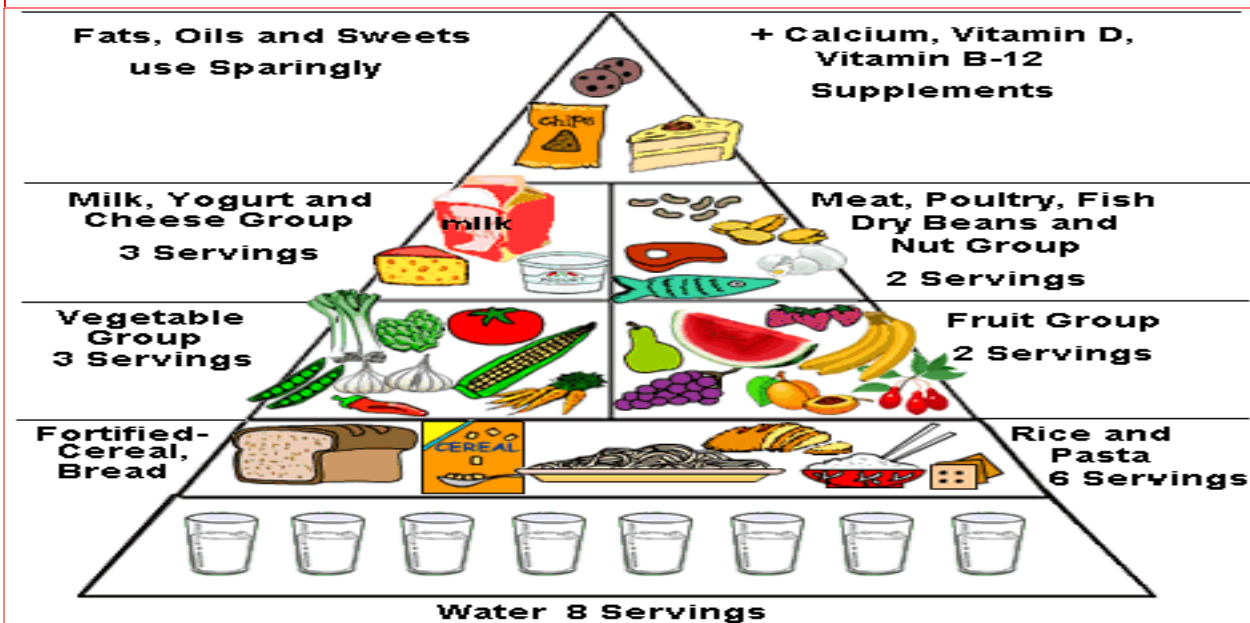


In Physical Education, students are currently on their Volleyball Unit. The rules of the game, boundaries, strategies, and skills of the game have all been taught to the students. Students have been continuing to work on perfecting their underhand and overhand serves as serving is one of the hardest skills in the game of Volleyball.

Lifetime Health

In health class, students have been learning about the six classes of nutrients, food sources of the nutrients, and the functions of each type of nutrient. The students were also taught how to assess the nutritional value of foods, the importance of a healthful diet and how to plan a healthy diet for themselves or for someone with special health needs.

Next in health class, students will learn about the influences on their eating habits, the balance between food intake and physical activity, and ways to healthfully manage weight for a lifetime. 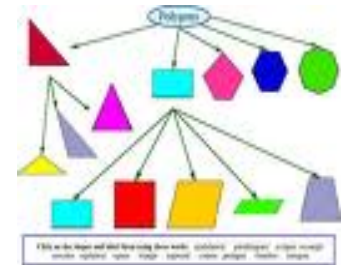
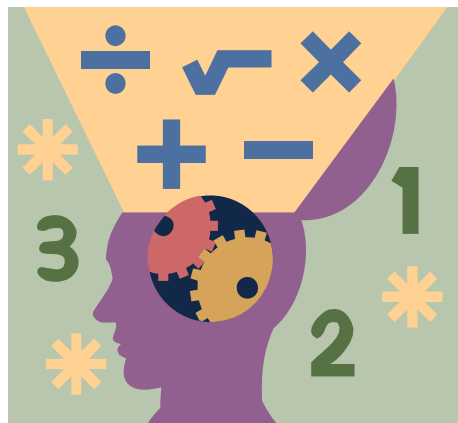

$\sqrt{-1}$ High School Mathematics



Welcome to the Mathematics Department. The focus of this marking period is to uncover multiple approaches to topics in algebra while making connections between algebraic concepts and real life applications. Basic concepts in calculus are also being reinforced with hands-on activities focused on conceptual understanding. These approaches have improved the performance of our students significantly .

Our Math team is made up of Mr. Ozrek, Ms Panagiotidis and Mr. Amponsah.

In Algebra I, The topics covered include: percentages and ratios, the number system, the order of operations, solving multi-step equations, solving inequalities and their graphs, relations and functions, measures of the central tendency , the mean, mode and the median.



In Algebra II our students are working on linear systems, slopes, graphing linear inequalities and solving multi-step equations. Functions and relations and their graphs were covered in detail. The graph of the parabola including the features like the vertex, the axis of symmetry and the minimum and maximum points were discussed.

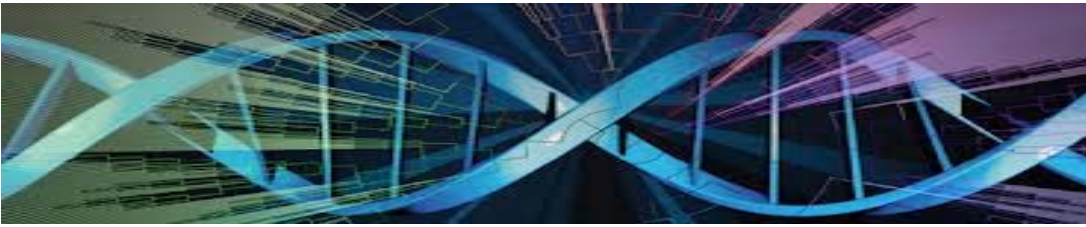
Our students will also learn the matrix algebra including finding the determinant and inverse of matrices and solving simple matrix equations. The use of the graphing calculator and solving problems from the computer will be introduced.



In Math Applications, the students continue their studies, preparing for the SAT and HSPA. This includes countless packets and flashcards, reviewing multiple solutions, and test taking strategies.

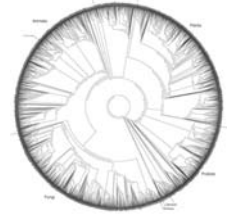
In Pre-calculus the class recently finished Functions. This included solving multi-step equations, as well as graphing (both with and with out a graphing calculator.) They will begin Polynomial Functions.

In Calculus the students are completing Derivatives and Integrations of functions. This includes Polynomial and Rational Functions, Tangent line equations, as well as finding the maximum/minimum.

Here's a look at what's ahead in the Sciences:



Biology I

In this class one of our goals is preparing students for the statewide exam. The big idea we've been studying is how cells work together to keep us alive and energized. They've just done a lab on fermentation. Later on we'll move into understanding genetics and ecosystems.

Chemistry

The sophomores are anxious to skip over theory and actually work with chemicals to make things happen. Unfortunately, there's a lot of theory and math in chemistry that makes it seem hard at the beginning. Once students understand how things are put together it can be fascinating. Right now we're in the midst of exploring the periodic table and electron orbitals. These provide the key to knowing what to expect when elements interact.

Biology II

The juniors are able to take a more in-depth look at the diversity of life around us. We've had hands-on labs examining fungi and mosses and plan on continuing to give them opportunities to explore in depth as we look at higher plants and animals.

Earth Science

Sandy provided an entry point for the seniors to examine the atmosphere and climate change. We're exploring how weather happens and what the impact of higher global temperatures might mean for our climate.

Science Electives

We just completed an elective on Ocean Studies, which was primarily a Marine Biology and Physical Oceanography course with labs. This term we'll be building and programming robots with *Lego Mindstorms*.
